

Ms. McLeish and Ms. Davis are coffee buddies in the morning, and Mrs. McLeish is in awe of Mrs. Davis's energy because on top of working on all day, Mrs. Davis "does extra activities for KHS like helping at pep rallies, dances, proms, football games, and even is a co-sponsor of P.E.A.R.L.S." According to McLeish "Ms. Davis is very nice, sweet, respectful, and professional." Mr. Davis said she is different from other counselors by taking time to get to know her students and by mentoring a few of them. Her students are allowed to be themselves when they talk to her, and they, her students, know that she truly care about them and is willing to help them out and listen to them."

She is also co-sponsor of the all-girls group named P.E.A.R.L.S, a mentoring group for girls all ages. There are after school meetings twice a month here at Kathleen, and they go places either after school or on the weekend to help expand their horizons. Mr. Davis is glad she is in this group because she didn't have the support when she was growing up. She also does charity events with P.E.A.R.L.S, and helps them with getting community service hours.

Mrs. Margarita Locke is the English as a Second Language Para Professional here at Kathleen High School who works with students who are learning English.

Before coming to work at Kathleen in 2015, Mrs. Locke worked with students in the ESOL program from different schools at Garner Elementary and Winter Haven Middle school. Currently, Mrs. Locke works with about 40 Spanish speaking students, and sometimes students who have progressed out of the program but who still need some help. When helping the ESOL students, she helps them with basic vocabulary, pronunciation, and with any English they don't already know in areas of communication, writing, listening, and reading skills. When working with the students, she sometimes has trouble because the education culture of the US is different than that of their home countries. Sometimes, her students have bad days where they bring themselves down because they think they don't belong here, which bothers Mrs. Locke. Because of this, she works hard to bond with her students to help them see that they have such great opportunities here, but they need to work hard, sometimes even harder than others, to achieve them.

Mrs. Locke was born in Cuba and attended the University of Havana where she received a Bachelor's Degree in Social Studies and a Master's Degree in Education. She speaks both English and Spanish, but admits that her Spanish is still better than her English. The family here at KHS have helped her improve her English because as her students work, she learns alongside them sometimes. She chose to work with the ESOL program because she felt closer to home with the students who came from a different countries and she too understands their struggles. When she has time to herself she likes to read books and think of new materials and new ideas to use with her ESOL students.

As an ESOL teacher Mrs. Locke has helped students graduate, pass tests, and has helped students understand the English language. According to teachers, Mr. Gulley and Mrs. Roque, they are thankful to have her because she is able to help the students be successful and has also helped these teachers to be better for their students. Students, like Lesly Aquino and Maria Diaz, are grateful to have her because she has done the best she can to help these students be successful, even when they didn't believe in themselves.
